AMAZE harnesses the power of digital media to provide young adolescents around the globe with medically accurate, age-appropriate, affirming, and honest sexuality education they can access directly online—regardless of where they live or what school they attend. We also strive to assist adults—parents, guardians, educators and health care providers around the globe—to communicate effectively and honestly about puberty and sexuality with the children and adolescents in their lives.

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AROUND THE WORLD

AMAZE launched in 2016 and is implemented globally with regional initiatives in sub-Saharan Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC), and addition to in in-country collaborations, including partnerships with community-based organizations, and or youth-centered youth-led groups, non-profits, and governmental agencies in approximately 50 countries. These partners lead the adaptation, creation, and dissemination of AMAZE videos internationally.

OVERVIEW OF THE GLOBAL PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAMME

We partner with organizations around the world to integrate existing AMAZE content into programming or resources, as well as subtitle, dub, adapt or creat AMAZE new videos. Partner can engage in one, or several types of partnership, depending on their needs and interests.

SUBTITLING AMAZE VIDEOS

- To subtitle AMAZE videos, you first should identify the list of videos that you would like to translate.
- Once you have a list, the AMAZE team will provide the necessary script files and guidance explaining how to create and translate subtitles.
- The AMAZE team will review the translations, share any suggested edits and upload the final subtitles to the corresponding videos on the AMAZE YouTube channel(s). Partners will be credited for their translations in the description of each video.



CASE STUDY

Roots of Health The Philippines

Roots of Health (Ugat ng Kalusugan; ROH), an organization that provides educational and clinical services to women, youth, and families in the Philippines, has subtitled serveral AMAZE videos into Tagalog (Filipino), all of which are available at AMAZE's YouTube channel.

DUBBING OR ADAPTING EXISTING AMAZE VIDEOS

What is **Dubbing?**

Dubbing is one of the most prevalent methods used to make video content available in multiple languages. It involves the translation and re-recording the dialogue of a video, without changing the message of the original video.

What is Adapting?

Adapting involves translating, re-recording the dialogue of a video, and making changes to the animation and script to ensure that it is culturally relevant to a target audience.

To dub or adapt an AMAZE video:

Inform AMAZE of the videos that you would like to dub or adapt. The AMAZE team can assist you in identifying videos based on topics of your interest.

The AMAZE team will give you access to all the files you will need to translate, voiceover, and make changes to the videos. You will be asked to send all new files to AMAZE at the end of the collaboration.

The AMAZE team will offer technical assistance and will review and approve your translations and the new dubbed or adapted videos.

You may publish and disseminate the videos as desired, and the AMAZE team can help you create a language page on Amaze.org to provide easy web access to the dubbed or adapted videos.

Austria

Lil*, a non-profit organization based in Austria that provides modern comprehensive sexuality education and health services with a focus on diversity, equality, gender rights, and social responsibility, has dubbed a variety of AMAZE videos, all of which are available on their youth-facing website, Ausgesprochen.





Pilcon Japan

The Program for Ideal Life through Communication & Networking (PILCON), a non-profit organization based in Japan that provides sexuality education to junior and high school students and parents, has subtitled and adapt many AMAZE videos, which they disseminate on their YouTube channel. AMAZE also hosts a feature page at amaze.org/japan/, as well as a Playlist on AMAZE's YouTube channel, featuring PILCON's subtitled and dubbed videos.



CREATING NEW VIDEOS WITH AMAZE

Are you interested in a collaboration to develop a new AMAZE video? If so, reach out to us sharing your idea or a topic of interest which has not been covered by AMAZE. Our sexuality education experts can work alongside partners to capture the overarching tone, main educational messages, background and resources relevant to the video. Our team can ensure video content is in line with standards set out by the International Technical Guidance on Sexuality Education (ITGSE). The creation of new videos can be credited to the partner and their sponsors, in compliance with branding guidance agreed upon by AMAZE.



CASE STUDY

The Smile Outreach Nigeria

In Nigeria, AMAZE works with the Smile Outreach- an organization based that partners with individuals and organizations to fight against cross-generational sexual relationships.

In 2021, AMAZE and The Smile Outreach collaborated on the development of a video and comic book exploring the issue of intergenerational, transactional sexual relationships, particularly between older men and girls.



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS



What does it cost to be able to subtitle, dub or adapt AMAZE videos?

Video production costs often depend on the type of animation, length of the video, number of characters, and extent of changes being made (if being adapted). These costs vary by country and video editing capacity within partner organizations.

To find out how much it may cost you to dub an AMAZE video, our team recommends reaching out to at least three local dubbing studios and, in the case of adaptations, three animation companies, and request estimates.

What are the different ways that partners are acknowledged for subtitling, dubbing, or adapting AMAZE videos?

Subtitled videos are credited within the video's description on AMAZE's YouTube channel. For dubbed and adapted videos, partners may also include on-screen credits for their work and sponsors.





Can we sell AMAZE videos?

This can depend on the circumstances and so is handled on a case by case basis. Please reach out to international@amaze.org.



Can we fundraise to subtitle/dub/adapt AMAZE videos? What kind of support can AMAZE provide in our fundraising efforts?

Yes. We encourage our partners to raise funds to carry out subtitling/dubbing/ adaptations of AMAZE videos and can provide guidance and background information on AMAZE to inform proposals.

We raised funds to subtitle/dub/adapt AMAZE videos and our funder would like to be credited in some way—how can we achieve that?

AMAZE is open to discussion around the best way to credit funders or contributors, such as including an end card crediting the funder(s) for supporting dubbing and/or adaptations of videos.



What are the steps to join AMAZE's Global Partnerships Programme?

Once we have reviewed your form, AMAZE will reach out to schedule a meeting with your organization. If both parties agree to collaborate, AMAZE will sign a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) agreement with the partner organization whereby AMAZE grants permission for the partner to initiate subtitling/dubbing/adapting of videos.

Who is involved in the creation of AMAZE animated videos?

AMAZE videos are heavily informed by technical guidance, inlcuding the US National Sex Education Standards for its US videos, as well as UNESCO's International Technical Guidance on Sexuality Education, regional, and/or national standards in other countries. In the development of AMAZE videos, a sexuality education content expert, usually from Advocates for Youth, develops a content brief that outlines the learning objectives for the video, provides key messages, and background information, with references.

For videos produced outside the United States, sexuality education content experts from Advocates and/or AMAZE regional and in-country partner organizations follow this same process. This brief is then used by animators/video production companies to develop a script, which is done in close collaboration with the content expert, followed by the storyboard and actual animation. The videos are also informed by young people, including Youth Ambassadors, who work to review and inform US AMAZE videos, and young leaders and peer educators from existing youth networks in other countries who work to review and inform videos and dissemination efforts at the country or regional level.
