



Racial justice is the systematic fair treatment of people of all races, resulting in equitable opportunities and outcomes for all.






Equality vs. Equity: What's the Difference?

Equality and Equity are not the same.

- **Equality** the state of being equal, especially in status, rights, and opportunities
- **Equity** culture of fairness and justice; centers positive outcomes for groups of people with social, racial, and cultural histories of marginalization.

Justice Is The Foundation



- Equity-building opportunities are required to correct inequities and disparities derived from years of injustices.









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Using AMAZE As A Tool For Racial Justice

- Media literacy racial bias and stereotyping
- Intersectionality People of Color are not monolithic
- Racial microaggressions and bias



The Racial Justice Lens


- Racial justice/racial equity is not a checklist, it is a lens that must be developed
- Applying a racial equity lens means to:
 - Analyze
 - Identify and support
 - Shift our choices and decisionmaking
 - Transform and heal ourselves
- Being an anti-racist educator who applies a racial equity lens is a way of thinking AND a way of being


